What's the deal with eBook and eAudiobooks and eAudiobooks??

Providing eBook and eAudiobooks and eAudiobooks for the community is something we are very proud to do. For many people, they are a great convenience. For others, they are essential in helping them access the books they are interested in. They allow the reader to carry several books, without the space or weight print books demand. They can be customized with different background colors, brightness levels, font styles, and sizes for people with vision challenges, and they can be accessed without having to physically visit the library, making them a great option for people with mobility or transportation issues.

Libraries are dedicated to providing this option, but we face many challenges in doing so. eBook and eAudiobook pricing models make it difficult to build our eBook and eAudiobook collections in the same way we do with our print collections. eBook and eAudiobook vendors and publishers charge libraries much higher prices for access to eBook and eAudiobooks and eAudiobooks. Further, the libraries do not own the eBook and eAudiobooks and eAudiobooks they purchase. Rather, we purchase a license to access the books, which typically expires after 2 years, or after a certain number of uses. If the library wants to continue to offer that title after it expires, they have to pay for it again.

This is not the same as buying a new print copy of a book that has become worn-out or damaged. While print books typically cost close to \$15 for libraries, or about 40% lower than their list price, eBook and eAudiobooks and eAudiobooks cost closer to \$50 per title, which is more than 3 times the cost of the same eBook and eAudiobook purchased by an individual consumer. eAudiobooks are even more expensive. Further, the eBook and eAudiobook licenses forbid us to lend them to other libraries the way we do with physical books.



How do we fix this?

CT Librarians are working with legislators to pass bills that would end these restrictive and expensive practices.
